






## Example: Roads & Streets: Data for July 30

#### **Roads & Streets**

Residents shared the need to repair roads and streets from potholes, cracks, damage and heavy-duty trucks

They expressed a need for streetlights, more signage and reflectors on signage in rural areas, and need wider roads in some rural areas.





#### **Public Transit**

Residents want more public transportation options such as trains, light rail, and electric car and bike rentals to move away from cars.

Transit that connects people. Transportation system for elders, disabled, and students. Public transport in rural areas, more and free, bus transportation to the airport and train station.

Faster transit, transit for greater independence. Buses in areas where they don't exist yet, green public transit, accessible transit.




#### Safety

Residents want to feel safe, secure and welcome while walking, rolling and riding.

Need neighborhood crossing safety, safe routes for pedestrians and bikers, safe bus stops, safe transportation, safe roads, safe streets, safe infrastructure and separation from walking/riding and cars. This is especially true for seniors and mobility challenged residents.








#### **Walkable Cities**

Residents want to live in a walkable, rideable city with dedicated protected bike lanes and well-maintained sidewalks.

Residents want walkable cities with sidewalks, walking trails, trees and shade, paths that connect to services and other transit options.


#### Keep Fresno County Moving

Renewing Measure C does not create a new tax-it continues an existing half-cent sales tax that has funded transportation improvements since 1986, generating \$4 million per year. This funding helps maintain our roads and public transit and keeps infrastructure in good shape.



#### How would you divide up the Measure C funds?

ecide how you want to divide the money by choosing a percentage for each category. The total must add up to 100%, and you can't pend more or less than that. For example, 100 points equals 100%, You can spend as much or as little as you want on each categorynothing at all.
